PARISH COUNCIL



Meetings took place on 31st January and 2nd March with an extraordinary meeting primarily to review planning applications on 9th March.

Councillors: There is one vacancy. Please apply to the parish clerk or contact one of the councillors for further information.

SIDS in January: 1 was located in Great Raveley recording traffic approaching from Woodwalton. Of the 16,142 vehicles recorded 32.66% exceeded the 30mph speed limit. 50 vehicles were recorded travelling at speeds between 50 and 60mph.

SID 2 was located by the cricket field entrance on the Huntingdon Road monitoring traffic approaching from Bury. Here 12.39% of 62,919 vehicles were exceeding the 40mph speed limit with 1,844 travelling between 50-60 mph, 44 travelling between 60-71 mph.

SIDs in February: SID 1 was located in Great Raveley recording traffic approaching from Huntingdon road. 14,507 vehicles were recorded with 28.52% exceeding the 30mph speed limit. 630 vehicles registered speeds ranging between 40 - 52 mph.

SID 2 was located by the allotments on Huntingdon road, recording vehicles approaching from Great Raveley. 7.9% of the 49,446 vehicles recorded exceeded the 40mph limit. 126 vehicles were recorded at speeds between 61 and 84 mph.

Councillors will consider potential projects for the Local Highway Improvement Initiative for 2021/2022 at the next meeting.

Community Matters: Arrangements are underway for installation of a defibrillator in the outside porch of the village hall. Plans for training will be confirmed shortly.

Youth Activities: "Active Lives" sessions will take place on Friday mornings from 10:30am to 12:30pm on 24th & 31st July & 7th August on the playing field in Upwood. on 14th, 21st & 28th August sessions will take place on the field at Bury Village Hall. These activities are suitable for children aged between 5 and 14. Local businesses or members of the public who may wish to sponsor one or more of these sessions are invited to contact the parish clerk.

Future Meetings: 6th April, 4th May (Annual Parish Meeting and Annual Parish Council Meeting). All are welcome to attend.

UPWOOD PRIMARY ACADEMY



We had a fantastic time celebrating World Book Day. Our children dressed up as their favourite book characters and took part in lots of story-based activities. Y4 made Paddington Bear pictures and Y3 worked in pairs to write their own stories. Y6 also got creative, producing comic books thinking about the title, speech bubbles, captions, cartoons and different sections of the comic. Y6 are now looking forward to reading their comics to their Foundation buddies! We also ran a decorate your door competition, with each class turning their door into a scene from a book. We had some amazing entries including The Tiger Who Came to Tea and Willy Wonka and the Chocolate Factory.

Congratulations to Y2 who had the winning door with Wind in the Willows.

It was wonderful to see the children so inspired and enthusiastic about reading. Thank you to all our families who helped create such imaginative outfits.

Y3 have been looking at their Design and Technology Cooking unit this month. Exploring food groups and categorising different types of foods humans need to grow to be strong and stay healthy. They worked in groups to create an 'Eat Well Plate', identifying which foods were protein, carbohydrate, fat, dairy or fruit and vegetables. They also blind tested different bread thinking about the smell, texture and taste of the product. They then had to guess which bread was which. They are now planning to make their own bread, using everything they have learnt.

The Thomas Deacon Education Trust schools came together to raise money for the NSPCC. We were very excited to take part in the Numbers Day to raise funds and awareness for the cause as well as building our children's understanding of numbers. Throughout the day our children created some fantastic drawings for the trust-wide competition, took part in numbers-themed lessons and even wore clothes with numbers on and Y4 also made some fantastic number collages. A special congratulation to one of our Y4 pupils who won a commendation for her 'collage of numbers', based on 57 Varieties of Heinz.

Our Y1 children have been reading Handa's Surprise as part of their 'On Safari' topic. They made delicious kebabs using the fruits from the story and enjoyed tasting exotic fruits that some had never tried before!

Y4 studied electricity with Mr Duddridge (Primary Science Champion) and really enjoyed learning through lots of fun practical experiments!

Our Foundation class continued with their scientific investigative skills this month to see if they could make a paper clip float. They began by thinking that metal was heavy and it would always sink, but soon realised that boats are made of metal too. The children displayed lots of perseverance and thinking skills and with the introduction of a piece of tissue paper their ideas grew, some of them even managed to make the paper clip float!

This proved to be a fascinating evening, particularly so when a photo could be amplified and put into context by personal experience.

Subject to future government guidelines, the next meeting will be on 20th May when Jeff Hawley will be talking about the US Air Force at Brampton and surrounding area at the time of WWII. Then, in a complete change of direction, on 15th July Liz Carter will be investigating the records of St Peters here in Upwood in "Reading Between the Lines". The group will also be visiting Kimbolton School and Castle on 27th May.

We welcome new members and occasional visitors. Membership is £10 for the year with visitors paying £4 per session, inclusive of refreshments.

DEWS' BUS SERVICE 415



Did you know that this service exists, because the editors didn't until they were told about it by one of our readers? The service was introduced in January and is on a 4-month trial, ending in April. It runs from Upwood to Peterborough, once a week, on a Wednesday. Leaving at 9.45am and arriving at Peterborough at 10:53am. It leaves

Peterborough at 13:30pm, giving travellers about 2½ hours in Peterborough. However, if you need more time you can always return on the 'normal' service, via Whittlesey. The timing means that senior citizens can use their bus pass!

The route starts in Upwood High Street, opposite the church, and turns up Meadow Road, (the safest place to wait is by the entrance to the allotments) but it seems that the driver is willing to pick up passengers anywhere safe along the basic route through the village. Very few people have taken advantage of this service and unless numbers increase it is very likely that the service will cease at the end of the trial period, so if this service is going to be retained villagers will need to use it quickly.



UPWOOD & RAVELEYS COMMUNITY ALLOTMENT ASSOCIATION



At the time of writing, the allotments do not look particularly inspiring, having been lashed by the dreadful storms of last month. The soil is saturated and allotment holders have needed to tread carefully in order not to slip and slide on the track leading up the hill. Plastic sheeting has been placed on several plots to cover the soil, as this method of planting proved popular last year and certainly saved folks from the task of heavy

digging and eliminating the necessity to weed. Some determined, hardy allotmenteers prepared their soil well in the autumn and are now adding fertiliser to improve their plot before planting. I have noticed several clumps of rhubarb venturing their red stalks and leaves above the surface, having benefited from the heavy rainfall.

The raised beds in the orchard area are looking fresh and colourful, especially with the planting of miniature daffodils. More compost needs to be applied soon to bulk out the beds. Unfortunately, some walkers are taking shortcuts across the orchard area in order to avoid the soggy track, so temporary fencing has been erected to protect the area.

We are delighted to announce that a new noticeboard made from recycled plastic has been erected just inside the entrance to the allotments on Meadow Road. Funded by a grant from Ramsey Community Benefit Fund and sourced through Fitzpatrick Woolmer Ltd in Kent, local gardener and landscaper, Andy Davis, with the willing support of Ali Miles and Tim Carter, erected it during dreadful weather. Our thanks go to them all for their great efforts! The noticeboard is well positioned allowing



notices to be viewed in weatherproof housing. The current key holder for displaying updates is Liz Carter.

A dance class is coming to Upwood Village Hall and as always, the newsletter team wanted to bring you the news 'hot off the press' so that you can take advantage of this

fun way to keep active and fit.

The class is going to be led by Michaella Walker, IDTA and I asked her a few questions to find out more about this exciting opportunity. The first question was "What sort of dance classes will you be offering?" "Ballroom & Latin beginner classes and Modern Jive beginner classes. No experience is necessary, total beginners are very welcome as well as those who have some dancing experience. It's always best to wear dance shoes or leather soled shoes as they will allow you to spin and glide on the floor. Trainers or anything with a rubber sole are definitely a 'non-starter'. However please don't buy shoes for the taster session but try to find a pair that will be suitable for your first foray". My next question related to paying for the classes. Michaella was quick to point out that classes are "Pay As You Go. There is no need to book in advance, you can just turn up on the night. In both classes I ask that everyone rotates partners throughout the lesson. This means that you can turn up on your own or with a partner. If you would rather stay with your partner throughout the session just let me know. It's not a problem, but from my experience it's like the blind leading the blind."

The taster session was going to be on Thursday 9th April at Upwood Village Hall: Beginners Waltz from 7pm-8pm and Beginners Modern Jive from 8.15pm-9.15pm. Each class will cost £6, but if you are really keen you pay just £10 for both classes. However, with the coronavirus situation Michaella has delayed the taster session until the situation improves.
