## THE INAUGURAL BARRY GOWLER TRACTOR ROAD RUN



This poignant event, in memory of local Upwood man Barry, took place on Sunday 10<sup>th</sup> July. Over 50 tractors, driven by Barry's family and friends from all over the county and beyond, gathered in the yard next to Helens Farm, Meadow Lane and it was a magnificent sight as they trundled up the lane and on up Meadow Road before turning right and heading off to travel around many local villages. All along the route the tractors and their drivers were cheered and many donated to the recipient charities, Macmillan Cancer Research and Sue Ryder. So far £10,015 has been raised. The road run, the idea of Barry's father-in-law and brother-in-law and organised by Zoe (Barry's widow) and three of Barry's friends, is hoped to become a bi-annual event.

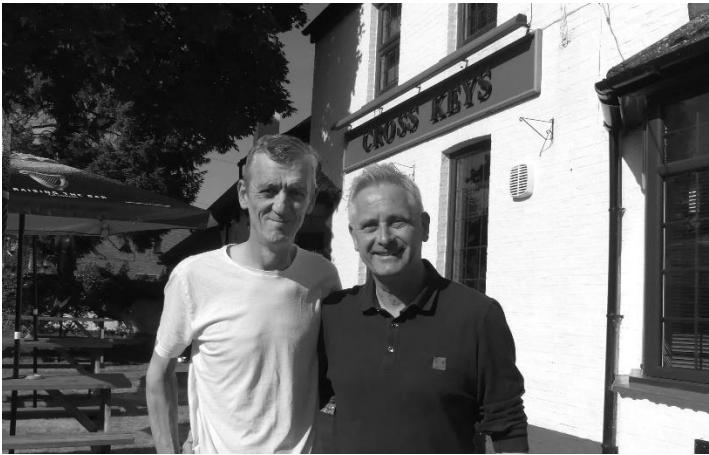

## THE CROSS KEYS RE-OPENS AT LAST



The Cross Keys, with Gary and Matt as the new operators, re-opened on 8<sup>th</sup> June. They have a 36-month lease, and are hoping to be able to buy this lovely, centrally-placed village pub eventually. They have lots of plans

to make the Cross Keys the hub of the village again.

Gary and Matt are business partners, with many years of experience between them. Gary is a chef and pub owner with 35 years of experience, while for Matt, a businessman, this is his first foray into pub management. They are looking forward to the challenge of a Free House and believe that the Cross Keys will have a good community spirit. They want it to be the central hub of the village and people's preferred place of choice for meeting up. They believe that they are custodians of the pub on behalf of the villagers. It is a family and dog friendly pub and their USP is that all the food is fresh, everything being cooked from scratch. Currently Gary is travelling to Smithfields and Billingsgate markets to buy the freshest food he possibly can.

The Cross Keys is open every day, except Mondays and food is served every day. Advanced bookings are preferred but not essential, apart for on special occasions such as the recent Fathers' Day when 120 covers were served! There is a range of beers, and the guest and house beers are changed on a weekly basis. The 3 cask, hand-pulled beers will be changed on a regular basis.

Gary and Matt are hoping to hold regular events including musical evenings and a monthly quiz. They intend to purchase 2 stretchy tents for the paddock and have plans for an outside bar. They want to work with the community and put on events that the parish will support. Their aim is to start small and expand, as and when the opportunity arises.

If you haven't visited the Cross Keys yet you are in for a treat. From the very friendly welcome to the new décor throughout and the ambient atmosphere it's an experience to savour. Matt and Gary and their team are waiting to welcome you to the Cross Keys.



The members of Home to Home have had a very busy few months. In May the Raptor Centre brought 4 of their birds to the village hall (the threat of avian flu unfortunately meant we had to be indoors) and the 2 handlers kept us brilliantly entertained for a couple of hours. Minnie, a male barn owl, Topaz, a tawny owl, Rafifici, an African spotted owl and Gem, a Harris hawk all behaved beautifully -there was absolutely no mess to clear up! Topaz & Gem flew for us. A lot of the myths surrounding owls were dispelled such as: they can see in the dark, they are particularly wise, all owl calls to one another using twit twoo. A lovely informative and totally enjoyable evening.



In June we visited the garden of Carlton House, High Street, Upwood. We had a lovely sunny afternoon to view all the wonderful plants, shrubs and trees that owner Lindsey has nurtured over the past 20 or so years.

Lindsey was on hand to answer our questions and to give guided tours of her very special garden. We had a great time and cannot thank Lindsey and Peter enough for their hospitality. At the end of June some of the members and their partners went to the Shakespeare at the George production of Romeo and Juliet. Once again, we were blessed with great weather and a very enjoyable production.

Unfortunately, the unprecedented hot weather caused the postponement of our July meeting when local illustrator Esther Rowley was due to be our guest speaker. We are hoping that she will be able to visit us in the near future instead and inspire us all to become more artistically creative.

## UPWOOD COMMUNITY ORCHARD



If the Community Orchard was pink all over in June, it is definitely going to be brown all over in July and August. A recent aerial photograph clearly shows not only the wonderfully neat paths (thank you, Jim!) but also just how parched the whole area has become.

This prolonged dry spell means that extra care and attention needs to be given not only to the trees, but also to the newly planted raised beds. I am currently looking for volunteers to help with the raised bed watering rota – each volunteer will be given a time slot of their choice and they only need to water the once, not every week. The water is in the tank with a watering can behind it so no need to bring anything with you. Some concern was raised about helping when you have dogs on a lead but they can be tied or tethered to the bench whilst you take 10 minutes to do the watering. Anyway, calling all those lovely local folk who kindly sponsored a tree a few years ago as well as anyone who regularly walks through the site – please come forward to help preserve this peaceful haven during this difficult season.

Meanwhile, despite the extreme heat, the summer prune has started for the plums and gages. This is the one chance to tidy up these vigorous trees as winter pruning can give rise to silver leaf. Very few plums set this year due to the late frost but hopefully this annual cut will help provide a good crop next year. As the apples and pears are all standard bush trees, they do not get a summer prune but will wait until the winter.

The apples, unlike the plums, appear to be laden with fruit – some of this has already been thinned and further reductions are being made to prevent broken branches. However, the biggest threat right now is the birds, specifically the rooks. There are so many of them in the village now and water is so short that they are pecking out anything that seems to contain moisture – in this instance, unripe apples which, if left on the tree will go rotten very quickly and spread disease. An early morning visit to the Orchard will see a huge flock of rooks (with some pigeons) lift off the trees, leaving behind a sorry sight. Hopefully there will still be some fruit to harvest at the end of the summer.

## UPWOOD CRICKET CLUB

Juniors: The youth section of the club continues to thrive. More and more juniors are joining, particularly in the younger age groups and it is wonderful to be able to coach so many on a Monday night. The new influx of coaches this year has really helped to make the difference. All the practice is really paying dividends in the matches, especially fielding where we have won games because of it even if other teams have had equally good bowlers and batters.



One such game was the ECB Under 15 County Cup Final vs a strong and experienced Godmanchester side on 27<sup>th</sup> June. Batting first Upwood made a creditable 123/7 off our 20 overs, with a quickfire 42 from George Buckle being the star batting

performance. In reply Godmanchester batted well and were well in contention with plenty of batting to come until two flashes of brilliant fielding turned the game. An initial fumble behind the stumps from George Tuffin caused the Godmanchester skipper to try to scamper a bye, but the wicketkeeper took off his glove and threw the stumps down! Godmanchester were still going strongly until Jacob Milner, fielding at backward point, dived to his right to stop the ball and whilst still in mid-fall shied and hit the stumps, running out the opening batter. The game continued to be tight, but Upwood held their nerve and won with 8 runs to spare.

As well as the U15 there have been lots of games for all our other age groups, U13, U11 and U9. All are doing well and, overall, we have won more games than we have lost. Coaching continues Monday nights until the end of August (exact date to be decided) and new players are always welcome to come along: U11 (School Y6) and younger will be from 5.10 to 6.20 pm: U12 (School Y7) and older will be from 6.30 to 7.45 pm.

Seniors: The Saturday 1st team have slipped to fourth in the Hunts League Division 1 and have now won 5 out of their 8 games. The team put in a great performance against Falcon XI, bowling them out for 142 in just 30 overs with Aussie Jake Wynd bagging 4 wickets for just 16 runs. Ex-skipper Mitch Newman (60 not out) then steered Upwood home in just 29 overs, but only after a scare when the Super U's had stumbled to 19-4. The second team are still top of the league and recently got back to winning ways against Waresley 2nds. Waresley batting first put on 197/4 in 40 overs, which would have been a lot more if the 'golden arm' of Adam Dean had not clung onto a catch on

the boundary to dismiss their number 4 who had made a classy 87. The Upwood chase was measured but purposeful, and the total was surpassed in the 37<sup>th</sup> over for the loss of just 3 wickets. Star performers were 16-year-old Oli Parncutt with an unbeaten 76 and another 50 for captain Andy Taylor.

The Sunday 1<sup>st</sup> Team are 3<sup>rd</sup> in a very tight Rutland Division 4 with 5 teams in title contention. One recent highlight was against East Carlton who were dismissed for just 96 runs; Upwood got the runs in 17 overs thanks to a devastating 75 from Sam Brooks, which included one huge six which sailed over the pond and into the horses' field! This league is still wide open and promotion is a definite possibility.

It has been a very busy few months down on the allotments, with produce growing fast, and everything now becoming very fruitful, the only drawback being we are all a little short of the “wet stuff”! The ‘allotmenters’ have been busy trying to keep their produce alive by watering whenever they can, or keeping on top of the weeds that seem to grow regardless of whether or not there is rain.

The vegetable patches in July are full of delights: salad leaves, peas, beans, potatoes, beetroot, artichokes and tomatoes are all beginning to bear fruit. The rhubarb and asparagus generally have their last pickings at the beginning of the month and can now be left to freely give goodness back to the roots, so that they can provide next Spring's delights.

During a walk in June the strawberries around the allotments were in full bloom and looked incredibly tasty, now most have been picked and I wonder what delights they made, was it fresh strawberries and cream or a bountiful amount of strawberry jam? The gooseberries, as well as the black and red currents are all ready to harvest.

In June we held a committee meeting where we started discussing the option to have a community shelter, which would have the added benefit of helping with the collection of rain water. These discussions are ongoing and we are researching the relevant funding opportunities – eventually, however, this shelter will be all for the community to use whilst wandering around our wonderful village allotments.

Well, it's been a busy few months for the foodbank in Ramsey, where we saw a two-fold uplift in numbers in May. This was mainly due to the fuel increases along with the rising cost of food in our supermarkets. As a result, the trustees and volunteers made the decision to provide support via summer

parcels to surrounding schools. Veronica Barker, our Thursday team leader, contacted the schools directly and asked if they had parents whose children were entitled to free school meals who would benefit from receiving such a parcel. These children are known as Pupil Premium children and all schools keep an up-to-date list. Next, we decided which items should be included in our support parcels and made the decision to include not only food but sun cream (it's such an expensive purchase, but so necessary at this time of year); a small game or book (to keep the children occupied); and ready to freeze ice pops or lollies (a nice treat in this hot weather). Every year we take part in the summer collection at Tesco so it was agreed that we would use these donations to supplement our packs. Incredibly the generous people of Ramsey, and surrounding areas, donated seventy trays towards our cause! We were overjoyed with this contribution, and send a **giant** 'thank you' to you all.

It should also be noted, with further thanks, that we had an amazing array of volunteers who 'peopled' the Tesco stand for us. They gave their time and energy in two-hour slots, explaining the work of the foodbank, collecting donations, sorting them, and handing out leaflets. This kind of support isn't everyone's 'cup of tea' but it's a vital part of our work. We also used some of our cash, cheque, and online donations to fund the shortfall and were also able to make use of Morrisons 15% charity discount card – which helped enormously. They also supplied us with fifty-seven bags to pack the parcels. Thank you, Morrisons in St Ives. Six trolleys later (including a second shop in Aldi), along with food already in stock thanks to Judith Hyde, our Tuesday team leader, we had enough goods. Finally, it was down to our amazing volunteers, including Upwood's own Paul Charman & Jo Paxton, to pack and distribute all one hundred and sixty-nine parcels. Yes, that's right – **one hundred and sixty-nine**. Gosh, we picked a very hot day to get the job done, but with grit and determination that's what we did, also drawing upon the Ramsey Community bus and our mayor, Roger Brereton, who kindly drove it.

Just to finish, may I add that we are open at St Thomas a Becket church Ramsey, every Tuesday and Thursday between 10am and 12pm, and are always ready to serve those in need of support – with food, monetary advice (through HAMA, Rural CAB or our other agencies), a prayer, a chat, or just a good old cuppa!
