## UPWOOD COMMUNITY ORCHARD



The Community Orchard has a new addition — the willow frame, originally made for my sweet peas in a pot this past spring, decided to grow and grow. So, what better place to put the now redundant but growing frame than the soggy patch in the bottom corner of the Orchard! Let's hope that it continues to thrive, drinking up all the surplus water and producing some useful willow for more sculptures and frames.

Meanwhile, the new volunteer group – the Upwood Community Orchard Volunteers (shortened to COV) – has been hard at work. We meet up for two sessions (one mid-week, one at the weekend) every month and tackle specific tasks. In September we harvested the remaining fruit which was put out for visitors to help themselves and tidied up the raised beds. October saw the group creating three new wild flower areas and sowing the donated wild flower seed mix. We also planted up the green tubs by the seats with spring bulbs and violas for some winter colour. The mint and geranium plants that came out have been potted up and will reappear next year.



A big 'thank you' to Ali, Chris, Colin and Mike who all turned out in October and to Lesley, Liz and Carol who helped in September – you were amazing! The November tasks will be much less demanding; checking the stakes and bands on trees and cutting back the perennials in the raised beds. Future tasks include winter pruning of the fruit trees, hedge trimming and filling the gaps with new bushes.

More helpers are always

welcomed and needed so if you would like to join our band of volunteers, please contact Liz Carter (813008, email: lizcarter261@btinternet.com). You don't have to come to every work party – pick and choose what suits you. Your contact details will be added to the group list and you will be invited to join a work party each month. There is very little heavy, manual work – mostly pruning, snipping, tidying, seed sowing and weeding. Please bring your own gloves and a drink but cake/biscuits are provided!

Autumn term highlights: It was great to see that the garden had survived the summer. The children very much enjoyed harvesting the remaining produce, pulling the sunflower seeds, and sampling the lovely fresh vegetables. The



carrots are still growing, and the children can't wait to start pulling them up. At the end of September, we said farewell to our tomato plants. The children spent the morning harvesting the remaining green tomatoes, which we made into delicious chutney. There were lots of eager helpers and something a little different for their taste buds to try. All that remained to do was some weeding and resetting our strawberry plants. Our efforts have made space for spring bulbs — any donations would be gratefully received!



October bought with it pumpkins, conkers and lots of falling leaves. One of our families kindly donated some pumpkins that the children really enjoyed carving. They got to practice using knives and spoons to carve the pumpkins together with great teamwork; the seeds were roasted, which were a huge hit. We collected lots of fallen leaves, which were used to create some wonderful autumnal artwork, and the conkers were transformed into necklaces. The children showed great determination and patience and after carefully counting, drilling, and threading they were incredibly proud of their creations.



Looking ahead to the festivities, we can't wait to enter an USTT Christmas tree at the St Peter's Christmas Tree Festival. This follows a centuries long tradition that paused during COVID. To get USTT and UPA families together in a social sense we'll be holding a Christmas Carols evening on 14 December. The children will soon be practicing their renditions of their favourite carols and we grown-ups are invited to enjoy a mulled wine or hot chocolate, and mince pies.





with generous donations for our Harvest table, which were donated to Ramsey Food Bank. KS1 children learned about different pumpkins and squashes, comparing weight



## **UPWOOD & RAVELEYS COMMUNITY ALLOTMENT ASSOCIATION**



The last few months have been busy down on the plots, getting them ready for the winter, and thinking about next year. However, there are also still some winter vegetables to be harvested like leeks, cauliflowers, brussel sprouts and parsnips. I have a few remaining leeks which I will be putting with my desiree potatoes to make leek and potato soup for a winter warmer, and I am looking forward to my first ever home-grown sprouts for Christmas this year.

This month I was fortunate to inherit another water storage container along with a whole load of fruit bushes meaning, my fruit plot has commenced and I am very excited. The next step is to build the frame to protect them all from the birds.

The committee has been busy working on its plans for a new community shelter and some more water storage from the shelter. We hope to update the



community in the new year of the full plans. Plot 9 is proposed as the new site, which has great views across from the small hill into the distance. It also allows for the plots at the top of the allotment site to collect water a little nearer to their plots. We are planning to open-up a little part of the hay field for some mini plots in the not-so-distant future. Other plans include an updated seed swap area and even possibly a place to share / swap plant plugs.

We have also managed to secure 6 green bins for green composting from Huntington District Council. These bins have been very well received by the allotment community and have been used a lot since they arrived for composting materials, especially branches and weeds. We still encourage all plot holders to compost their own food waste, grass clippings and leave, as well as mulching your plots as much as possible.

An open Facebook page was recently launched so please do follow us for updates at **the Upwood & Raveley Community Allotment Association – URCAA** – please give us "a like" and follow all our news. Our waiting list is open so if you would like to consider a plot for the coming year, please don't hesitate to contact Avni on **urcaasecretary@gmail.com**.
