PARISH COUNCIL

The Parish Council is pleased to welcome parishioners to the PC Meetings which are held on the first Monday of the month except for May when the date CHANGES because of the Spring Bank Holiday. There will be no meeting in August. Meetings now start at 7.00pm in the Village Hall.

ELECTION OF NEW PARISH COUNCILLOR: The Council was faced with the difficult task of electing the new Parish Councillor. Three excellent candidates presented themselves and after much deliberation it was agreed to appoint Jason Edwards. Jason has a lifelong connection with Upwood, managing the family farm and running the farm shop. He previously served as a governor of Upwood School. His knowledge of the land around Upwood and local history, combined with his responsibility as District Officer for the local Drainage Board means we have a valuable addition to the Parish Council.

SPEEDWATCH: Two more volunteers have come forward so that Upwood and the Raveleys will qualify for signs to be erected stating that this is an official 'Speedwatch Area'. The erection of these warning signs on entry to other villages has been seen to cause motorists to reduce their entry speed to the built up area.

CROSS KEYS PUBLIC HOUSE: See front of Newsletter.

CARS PARKING ON PAVEMENTS: Car Drivers need to be aware that they are liable to be issued with a fixed penalty notice if they park on the pavement. Parking on the pavement is illegal, as the vehicle is causing obstruction to users of the pavement.

BARRIER GATE TO ALLOTMENT: A gate has been purchased and will be fitted at the Meadow Road entrance when conditions allow.

FOOTBALL PLAYERS: The playing field is due to be cut in April so that football playing can be started there again. **Ball Games are NOT PERMITTED on the play area in Bentley Close. Dogs are not permitted in either the play area or the playing field.**

DITCHES, DRAINS, POTHOLES AND ROAD SIGN DETERIORATION: The Council is currently addressing these issues

NEW WOODLANDS CENTRE at Hinchingbrooke Hospital: The Parish Council received a request for financial assistance from the charity that is raising funds for the extension to the Woodlands Centre which supports the treatment and recovery of cancer patients. The Parish Council agreed to donate £20. Individual groups may like to arrange fund raising events within in the village for this worthy cause.

DOG WALKERS: DON'T BE THE FIRST OWNER TO BE FACED WITH A FINE OF £1,000.

Only a few dog owners are guilty of not clearing up after their pet. This annoys responsible owners who do and other residents who discover it, whether walking in the village or over to Lady's Wood.

Five dog waste bins are located around the village and a sixth will be ordered for the junction of Church Lane and Huntingdon Road. Dog owners need to be aware that the council will press for prosecution of owners failing to clear up after their dogs; parents will be held responsible if the dog causing the mess is under the control of a child.

As well as looking round the usual exhibits in the museum such as the Bronze Age Round House (pictured) 27 members and friends were thrilled to be able to see the log boats 'in situ'. The preservation of these wonderful Bronze Age boats is following exactly the same process used to preserve the Mary Rose and



we were delighted to be given a glimpse under some of the bubble wrap (kindly arranged by Mark Knight) and see the intricate carving for ourselves.

The next meeting is on 21st May and will be a talk by Mike Petty on "Cambridgeshire in World Wars 1&2". We know that Mike is a knowledgeable and entertaining speaker. In July there will be a talk by Liz St Hill Davis with the intriguing title "Kill or Cure- Doctor T.J. Walker".

VILLAGE HISTORY PROJECT

UPWOOD TABLE TENNIS CLUB (TT) - A SEVEN YEAR HISTORY OF SUCCESS

In 2007 the idea for a Table Tennis club was put to me by Bob Child. At that time I had approached Bob for a private booking for a few friends to play but instead advertised for general interest in the Village Newsletter. I had thought of running the club in the daytime but the response suggested evenings would be better. So, on 13 March 2007 we kicked off on a Tuesday night from 8-10pm with 6 members and charged £2 per head. We were allowed to use the youth club table which we had in the back hall and we discovered how much fun could be had playing doubles.



Our previous experiences of the game were mainly from our schooldays, so we were all a bit rusty and had to get acquainted with the latest rules and changes. The diameter of the ball had moved from 38mm to 40mm, scoring to 11 points (previously 21) to win a game and changing serve every 2 points (previously 5).

Balls were now white or orange and bat technology had advanced enormously - the blade (wooden bit) of different weights and balance, the rubbers graded by speed, control and spin. Having understood all of that some players still preferred to keep the bats they were used to.

The first year saw a slow increase in membership but by the summer of 2008 it had increased to 16. Word had finally got around that Table Tennis was a **SUPER FUN GAME!** Friends brought friends until we had 20 members by the end of that year. We decided to limit the club to 24 members with a waiting list, and to purchase our own TT table so that we could use both halls with 2 tables, thus ensuring members got sufficient games during the evening.

About this time a committee was created to handle the club affairs. Those on the waiting list were allowed to play one Tuesday a month as guests so that they could feel part of the club and not forgotten. Within a very short space of time we were able to purchase a second table to replace the old youth club table which was on the point of collapse!

As well as enjoying the Table Tennis we all got on together socially and so we had our first summer coach outing to Hunstanton in 2009, subsidised by the club. The outing has become a tradition, with a different venue chosen by the club members every July. As time went on we introduced a singles night on a Monday for those who wanted more concentrated action

and although never as popular as Tuesday

doubles it has been highly successful in developing players' skills.

Tournaments have become a highlight of the year in March (doubles) and October (singles) with intense competition for the trophies. Also every March is the annual dinner danceagain heavily subsidised by the club and held in different venues, the latest involving a buffet meal with a live band in the village hall.

This year we have had tuition from a qualified coach, who has visited the club on 4 occasions, which has improved the overall

playing standard. One delight for club nights is the celebration of birthdays when a member brings cakes for all to enjoy.

Current membership stands at 32 with nobody on the waiting list. Average attendance numbers between 18 and 22, which allows most members to play several games during an evening. The atmosphere we have maintained on a club night is excellent, mainly because most players accept that the social side of the club is as important as the game itself.

We have recently started a daytime club operating on a Wednesday afternoon, which after only a few weeks has already proved to be very popular with as many as 18 people turning up to play. Several new faces have appeared, alongside some of the Tuesday evening players, and a good time looks guaranteed for all.

From an initial idea in 2007, seven years later the Upwood Table Tennis Club is going from strength to strength.

This is always an important meeting in the life of the Church, but this year it is especially the case. I believe that the Parish Church has a place in the life of the village. It has been going through testing times in recent years. The post of Vicar has been gone for some time now and there is little likelihood of it being re-instated. This means that there can only be Clergy at Sunday services for two Sundays in the month. However, there is a faithful if small group of people who are working hard to maintain the ministry of our Parish Church within Upwood. Not least for their sakes we want to find ways of staffing the other two Sundays.

In truth we need help. We have been grateful to Gordon Slinn who has acted as the named minister for the past four years, and has been a Licenced Lay Minister for many more years. Gordon is now retiring from that post as from the APCM. We need the members of St Peter's to rise to the challenge that is before us. We require two Church Wardens, members to come onto the Church Council and volunteers to keep the ship on course. I recognise that this is a sacrificial work in a busy life.

One sure way of knowing that there is plenty of good will is to have a better attendance at the Annual Meeting. Therefore I would like to encourage you to be present if you possibly can. Even if you can't take on any responsibility it will encourage us to know that you are there. Do keep St Peter's Church in your thoughts and prayers. Yours, Richard Darmody (Canon).

TREES OF UPWOOD - 2. ASH (Fraxinus excelsior)

This is the second of an occasional series of articles about our local flora and fauna.

The ash is the most frequent deciduous tree in our county. It occurs in woods, hedgerows, copses and railway embankments throughout the area and is especially common on clay soils. It is a major tree in our hedgerows since the loss of elms due to Dutch Elm Disease.

Ash is easily recognised in winter by its black, conical buds. Flowers appear in early spring before the leaves in dense clusters on the bare twigs. Each flower is insignificant; there are no petals because the flowers are pollinated by the wind so there is no need of showy flowers or scent to attract insects. The leaves are made up of several leaflets arranged in pairs along a midrib, with a single leaflet at the tip.

Fruits develop in clusters and are much more obvious than the flowers. Each one is made up of a seed with a broad wing attached to it. When the seeds are ripe, they are detached by the wind and the wing enables the seeds to be spread well beyond the parent tree so increasing its chances to grow into a new plant.

Ash is an important timber tree. Its wood is light coloured, strong and hard wearing and is used for furniture making, in house interiors and for making wooden implements. Recently, it has been much in the news because of a disease called *Chalar fraxinia* that has invaded this country causing the leaves to wilt and resulting eventually in the death of the tree. At present it is not known how many of our trees are likely to die. Urgent research is being undertaken to identify resistant strains in our native population in case we need to replant woodlands after they have been devastated by this disease.

On a walk round the village one can see a number of ash trees of varying age. There are some reasonably young specimens in the hedge line along the cricket field — no doubt planted to replace the dead elms. Older specimens are seen on the right-hand side of the road, while in Charters Spinney, there is a superb example of a mature coppiced ash with huge branches arising from a stool, many years of age. Why not see how many ash trees you can count on your next walk?

TRADING STANDARDS WARNINGS

Telephone scams

Beware of callers who claim to be calling about the non-payment of telephone bills and threatening to disconnect you unless immediate payment is made. Check the facts and contact your provider on the number provided in your paperwork. Ensure there is a dialing tone before calling them in case the fraudsters have remained on the line ready to pose as your service provider. If there is no dialing tone, try again in 5 minutes.

You may experience a series of silent calls, followed by a call from a company offering to help prevent silent calls, for a fee. This call is made by the same fraudsters who were making the silent calls.

Door-to-door callers

With regards to house alarms, beware of telesales calls (often followed up by a house call) offering an alarm system at virtually no cost. The catch is the annual service charge which amounts to thousands of pounds.

Beware of any trader who knocks at the door offering to do home improvement or gardening work for you, no matter how friendly they seem or how cheap the job appears. This is the prime way rogue traders find customers. Be cautious of door-to-door callers who claim to be ex-convicts who are trying to turn their lives around by items. Their story is untrue and once you buy they will call on you again and again.
