PARISH COUNCIL

A meeting of the parish council was held on Monday 4th September 2017 at Upwood Village Hall.

The first parish council surgery was held at the Village Hall on 9th September from 2pm until 3.30 pm. Unfortunately, this coincided with a very heavy storm over Upwood and the torrential rain discouraged any visitors. This is an opportunity for residents to meet with councillors to discuss their issues and concerns in a less formal setting than a full council meeting and without a time limit. Please come to the next one on 14th October at the same time.

Councillor Tew has met with Sergeant Street regarding ongoing problems of anti-social behaviour on the Upwood Airfield site. Demolition will not take place until a developer has been identified to realise the plans for 160 new homes.

Councillor Tew also informed members that whilst local police officers will continue to be based at Huntingdon Police Station, they will have access to welfare and computer facilities at Ramsey Fire Station in the near future (there will be no permanent police presence at the site and it will not be a combined police/fire station). Councillors approved grants to Upwood Village Hall and to the parish newsletter to help with operating costs.

It was also agreed that application will be made to the Local Highway Initiative 2018/19 for funds to purchase and install sites for a speed indicator device (SID) This temporary vehicle activated sign can be moved to different locations within the parish as required. It is designed to change drivers' speed behaviour by giving an actual speed of the approaching vehicle.

Councillor Smith and Councillor Nel reported on their attendance at a draft consultation meeting relating to Huntingdonshire's Local Plan up to 2036. They agreed that it had been informative and stressed the need for all to engage and comment on such consultations. Councillor Nel confirmed that she had commented on the lack of infrastructure planned to support new development in Ramsey and Bury. These developments, although in neighbouring parishes, will have a direct impact on through traffic in Upwood and the Raveleys. The consultation is now closed but will be reopened for a two-week window in October.

Discussions are ongoing regarding the provision of an external cabinet to hold the community defibrillator. This is being investigated and will be reviewed again at the next meeting on 2nd October. Please visit **www.upwood.org** to view or download the minutes.

CHARITY SWIM BY SAMUEL DAVIES



On Sunday 20th August, Samuel Davies, a pupil of Upwood Primary School completed a charity swim supported by Ramsey Leisure Centre.

Samuel, age 10, lost his Great Uncle Malcolm in April of this year after a short brave fight against cancer. Soon after losing Malcolm, Samuel announced that he wanted to swim a mile in memory of his uncle to raise funds for Wellsnext-the-Sea, RNLI Lifeboat Station. Although Malcolm Smith, originally from Ramsey, had lived most of his life inland this charity was close to Malcolm's heart and to

which he dedicated 40 years of service. Samuel was supported during his swim by friends and family and completed the 1 mile swim in 53 minutes. Samuel's efforts have been rewarded by raising an amazing £2,050 (including Gift Aid) so far!

Wells-next-the-Sea RNLI is going to replace their Mersey Class Lifeboat with a new Shannon Class Lifeboat. An entirely new Lifeboat House is needed to accommodate the larger boat and Samuel's sponsorship money will be put towards this.

Ramsey Rural Museum

We are rapidly reaching the end of the season as the museum closes to the public at the end of October. This does not mean that we have nothing to do. There is still a lot of maintenance, repairs and reorganisation of the displays to do.

In the meantime, the museum is open to the public on Thursdays (9.00am to 5.00pm) and in the afternoons (2.00 to 5.00pm) on Saturdays, Sundays and bank holidays. LIFE IN THE ANTARCTIC

Upwood man Connor Grange has recently returned home after a third season of working in the Antarctic at the British Antarctic Survey base at Halley Bay. This is his account of his experiences there.



MY ROLE AT HALLEY AND RELOCATION PROJECT



My role at Halley is a surveyor. My duties include annual raises of the modules, comms towers and science cabooses. This work is carried out regularly due to the annual snowfall on the shelf, which is approximately between 1.2 and 1.4 metres. All infrastructure on the station is either movable or can be raised. If this was not the case buildings and towers would be buried within years. That mistake was made when Halley III was built in 1973. This season at Halley,

was very different. A crevasse in the ice shelf has appeared and is accelerating rapidly. This means that the station needed to be moved 25km further in from the coast, otherwise Halley could have found itself floating around on an iceberg. The modular buildings are mounted on skis. This allows them to be moved when needed.



ABOUT THE STATION AND SCIENCE AT HALLEY

The base sits on the 150m thick Brunt Ice Shelf, and is the sixth such UK facility to be erected at this location since 1957. Halley gathers important weather and climate data,



playing a critical role in the research that identified the ozone hole in 1985. Recently, Halley has also become a major centre for studying solar activity and the impacts it can have on the Earth. Temperatures at Halley during the summer season (our winter) can range from OC to -20C, however during their winter months there's complete darkness



for over 4 months and temperatures can drop to -55C. Pictures of Halley usually only show the blue and red modules (picture on left), however there are also many science cabooses (portacabins on stilts) dotted around the station. These gather vital research that is shared among the international science community.

Halley is also a stopping point for polar air travel.

ARRIVING AT HALLEY

Arriving is a huge logistical challenge. A team of existing staff at Halley head out to find

a nice sturdy piece of ice for the ship to moor up. It then takes up to 2 weeks to unload the ship's cargo. However due to the relocation season, air freight cargo is also needed. Everyone who works at Halley is required to help with unloading and work shifts of 12 hours to get everything to the station as quickly and efficiently as possible.



STATION LIFE

We usually have to create our own entertainment around the station and often we find ourselves binge watching our favourite box sets and movies. At weekends, the field guides arrange a variety of activities including Ice climbing, abseiling and trips to see

penguin colonies. Nearing the end of the season, the annual folk night is held. People get the chance to show off their talents, or in my case, having enough beer to do a Johnny Cash impersonation!! Recently it was noticed, only by somebody spotting it from a plane window, that a second crack had appeared on the ice shelf (pictured right). As the



season progressed so did the crack, measuring over 44km in length and continuing to grow at an alarming pace (continued on next page).

LIFE IN THE ANTARCTIC (CONTINUED)

Around mid-January the decision was made to not winterise the station. This would mean no staff would be staying at the station over the Antarctic winter period. We plan to reoccupy the base in November 2017.

HEADING BACK TO CIVILISATION

Departing Halley, our voyage requires us to pass through the infamous 'Drakes Passage', one of the roughest stretches of sea on the globe. Finally, after many days of constant sea sickness, we arrive at the Falkland Islands. After a couple of days touring the Falklands the time comes to catch an MOD flight back to Brize Norton. I now find myself eager to get straight back, the place really does get under your skin and is truly like nowhere else on earth.

UPWOOD AND THE RAVELEYS HISTORY GROUP

The July meeting was enthralled to listen to Clive Beeke talking about the closing over of the Great Whyte and recent renovation works which have been taking place on the tunnels' roofs, built between 1852 and 1854 using 2,000,000 bricks. Members were amazed to see the intricate standard of brickwork that lies under Ramsey's streets — the builders obviously weren't daunted by the fact that their craftsmanship was unlikely to be seen by many people. Clive described what the Great Whyte looked like before it was covered over and showed us on a large map where certain buildings, including shops and pubs, were located. He also informed us that the original mechanism of the town clock was driven by the flow of the water through the tunnels.

In September Maureen Jones regaled us with tales of the old Fenland storytellers while on 15th November Mike Petty is our speaker and his talk is entitled 'From pony to guided bus'. This talk comes highly recommended so do come along and hear how the transport system in Cambridgeshire has advanced over the decades.
